ABOUT THE SHOW

In 2022 the Jopuka Writers' Club began working on a collaborative project based on the prompt "The top five ways the world will end according to Professor Brian Cox."

Those methods of extinction, according to Cox in a 2015 interview, are as follows:

- 5 Supervolcano
- 4 Plague (yes, this was before COVID)
- 3 Supernova
- 2 Asteroid
- 1 Stupidity

We used this as impetus to explore both real and metaphorical ideas about how the end of the world might look, or more importantly feel. The loss of a parent or an asteroid plummeting into the earth can both feel equally as world ending and life changing.

Our writers then embarked on creating a series of drafts before leaving it in the hands of facilitators Danielle Brame Whiting and Jamie Hornsby to edit and sew these scenes together into the production you are seeing this weekend, The Mortality Project. Packed to the brim with ideas from a team of brilliant young creatives, and highlights the unique and unexpected approaches each writer chose to tackle this prompt - some heart breaking, some hilarious, often at the same time!

The Mortality Project is the beta test for what we hope will be many years of collaborative writing projects with our Jopuka Family.

"Some say the world will end in fire, some say in ice...but I reckon it'll probably be those damn octopuses. They definitely know something we don't. And they've got really freaky legs." – **Tallulah**

"In a way, it's difficult to NOT write about the end of the world these days. In a world where the future looks increasingly uncertain and there seems to be a new existential threat popping up every other week, finding a way to interrogate and express these ideas through art seems more vital than ever." – Jamie

"An area that fascinates me is exploring the way our perceptions adjust as we tuck more years under our belts. In this way I was more attracted to the idea of something 'feeling' like the end of the world, as opposed to the demise of the human race. Our physical demise is just a little too much for me on a Monday." – Danielle

"I don't know how the world will end (so stop asking me). I found that thinking about it is inherently quite sad, but the deeper you go with the thought, it becomes fairly interesting. The more I thought about it, the more I realised that some major corporation would 100% be involved in the end of the world, whether it be directly caused by them, or they somehow profit off it, I don't know." -Ethan

'The end of the world could come about in various different ways. A giant spaghetti monster is a likely one, or you know, global warming. But sometimes, the end of the world can be things on a smaller, more personal scale, that feel just as 'life or death.' - **Brooke**

"With the end of the world looming before us, surely there are more possibilities for the cause of doomsday then we'd expect. From meteors, to catastrophic floods, to an army of genetically modified, super-human, zombie chickens, the ideas can truly be overwhelming. But perhaps the true end of the world as we know it, are the friends we made along the way." - Kani
